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Student Orientation and Academic Registration (SOAR)

It won't be long before you begin your career at Juniata. As you prepare for this transition, you will have many questions about classes, campus life, housing, finances, and other important matters. Summer Orientation is providing the opportunity for new students, parents, and/or guardians to ask questions, get answers, and become familiar with the faculty, staff, students, and campus of Juniata.



Registration Information

Each orientation session begins at 11 a.m. and ends after lunch on the second day. There is no charge for orientation. Other family members (such as younger siblings) are welcome to attend, however, no special programming is provided for them. **To register, please fill out the Summer Orientation Reservation Form located at www.juniata.edu/orientation.** For best selection of dates, please register as soon as possible (sessions do close). Once we receive your registration form, we will send additional information about the program and confirm your session dates. **All new students are expected to attend an orientation. Please be sure to register by May 4, 2018.** If you are unable to attend in June or August, or if you have any questions, please contact: Ellen Campbell, 814-641-3150, quest@juniata.edu.

Information Sessions

Informational meetings will be held for students and family members on topics such as the Juniata curriculum, academic programs, residential life, financial aid, career planning and placement, campus technology, international programs, and campus life.

Social Activities

Students will enjoy social and recreational activities for an opportunity to meet other members of their class. Also, students and families can take advantage of the Kennedy Sports and Recreation Center with its indoor pool, racquetball courts, and fitness center. Family members will be treated to an evening picnic on Raystown Lake. The largest lake wholly in the state of Pennsylvania, Raystown Lake is minutes from campus and offers swimming, boating, fishing, hiking, biking, and camping.

Housing and Meals

All meals for students, families, and guests are provided free of charge. Overnight accommodations are provided at no charge to students, and they are expected to stay overnight in campus housing for orientation. Families and guests should plan to stay at local accommodations. A very limited number of on-campus housing options are available for families and guests with special circumstances. What is Inbound?

Inbound is a four-day program for Juniata's new students. A combination of small group retreats and large group activities helps participants meet their new classmates, get to know upper level students, and become acclimated to campus without the demands of coursework. Inbound offers a wide variety of retreat theme options to choose.

First-year students are highly encouraged to participate. Last year, more than 89 percent of incoming students kicked off their Juniata adventure with Inbound.

Who leads Inbound?

Each retreat group has approximately 10 first-year students and is led by two upper level students who guide participants through the Inbound program. Each retreat group also has a Juniata faculty or staff adviser.

The Juniata College Curriculum

Juniata College students design their education to *connect* ideas, *engage* with people and issues, and learn to *discern* meaning and value. Our Curriculum strengthens every student's understanding that to get better answers, one must ask better questions.

Intellectual Foundations

✓ **Connect:** Understand how different disciplines think, connect, and collaborate.

✓ **Engage:** Through interaction and experimentation, engage with problems to ask better questions. The Curriculum requires both local *and* global engagement.

✓ **Discern:** Learn to discern the quality of knowledge and beliefs. How do we 'know' something is true? Who creates knowledge? How is it accepted? What makes an action ethical? Why?

Components

How will I choose to live my life?
Reflect on values, beliefs, knowledge, and experiences.

✓ **First-Year-Experience** courses (8 credits) support students as they transition to college life and to scholarly expectations. The entire year focuses on communication skills, strategies for navigating new demands, and building resiliency.

How and with what tools at my disposal will I understand the world?

Problem-solving requires a willingness to consider other perspectives.

✓ **Ways of Knowing** courses (12-15 credits) help students consider the world from different vantage points. Students critique disciplinary styles of inquiry, connect ways of knowing, and confront complexities in our urge to organize and impose meaning.

✓ In a **Connections** course (3 credits), students consider a common topic through two ways of knowing in a team-taught environment with two faculty from disciplines intellectually distant from one another.

How will I choose to act in the world?
Develop a wide base of reference for ethical questions.

✓ In **Self and the World** courses (12 credits), students enhance interpersonal skills, gain experience understanding people with different histories, and consider diversity, culture, and ethics. All students participate in local *and* global community engagement, a signature element of the Curriculum.



✓ All students work on a **Senior Capstone** (6 credits). The capstone may involve global or local engagement, research, internships, extra-curricular or co-curricular experiences and more as part of student's complete reflection on their education. The capstone project requires students to engage in critical and personal reflection on their total work at Juniata.

The Curriculum provides an instrument to help with the capstone. Students use portfolios to record and highlight key experiences—whether papers, research, creative work, performances, or other artifacts. The portfolio helps construct their personal educational story and show their best work for employers, graduate schools, or others.

Value

Juniata College works with its students as they earn the most useful and powerful kind of education—one grounded in how to learn, communicate, and grow understanding of themselves and the world. A student's successful completion of the Curriculum compels them to reflect on how their stories apply to employment, graduate school, service opportunities, and other pursuits.

What is QUEST?

The Juniata College Curriculum pushes students to start solving problems, challenging knowledge, and tackling ideas intensively from their start at the College. Its intent is to challenge you, inspire you, and push you to question ideas, including your own. Expect to be asked to explore various possibilities for professional life, personal achievement, and engagement with the world. Knowing you may have questions, seek resources to improve, wish to explore career and educational options, and want to understand your strengths and opportunities for growth, QUEST exists to assist you when you are ready.

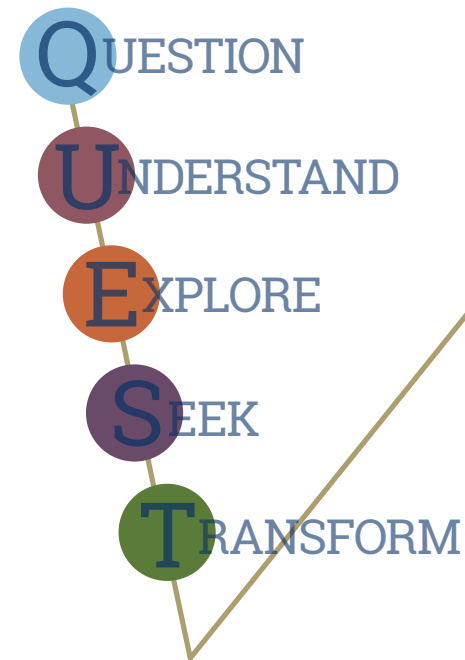

Academic Departments, Areas of Study, and Professional and Personal Goals

As you prepare for Summer Orientation, you may have questions about academic departments, areas of study, and your professional and personal goals. Please consider the following points:

✓ You have chosen to attend a liberal arts college. Graduates of liberal arts colleges are often characterized by a love of learning in general, an innate curiosity, and intellectual agility. In addition, liberal arts students master written and oral communication, and develop skills in research, collaboration, and problem solving. These are life skills, transferable to careers, home, and community service.

✓ The liberal arts will support exploration of what you love and where you will be most successful. Juniata does not ask you to submit a formal Program of Emphasis (POE) until your fourth semester. Every class you take will count toward the credits you need to graduate, fulfill a graduation requirement, or represent a start on POE coursework.

✓ Juniata's POE system provides you great flexibility. A list of our designated POEs is found at www.juniata.edu/registrar/poes. You can pursue a designated POE with a particular career goal in mind, or design an individualized POE with the help of your advisers.

✓ Based on your interests, professional goals, and academic interest you will be matched with an adviser. During orientation advisers will help you explore interests and register for fall courses.

✓ Your professional and personal goals will motivate and guide you throughout your college career. These goals may evolve over the next four years—the liberal arts both enable this and embrace it. Your advisers are an invaluable resource. As your goals develop and strengthen, take advantage of the good counsel of your advisers.

Academic Beginnings

Your Juniata academic journey begins at Summer Orientation through course registration. This is a multi-step process with support from online resources, peer student leaders, and an academic adviser. Your Summer Orientation adviser will review your course selections, discuss your potential Program of Emphasis, guide you through our curriculum, and then help you to finalize your schedule.



Preparing for Course Registration

After May 1, 2018, please start to prepare for course registration by visiting our "Advising and Course Selection" resource at www.juniata.edu/orientation. You will find helpful information that explains the course registration process, how to use WebAdvisor, and where to complete a world language assessment, among many other resources and tools.

To be fully prepared for the academic portion of orientation, please consider the following:

- ✓ Check your Juniata email regularly prior to orientation.
- ✓ Arrive with a list of possible courses for registration. We know this is a tentative list and will change as you gather more information at orientation and during your advising appointment.
- ✓ Be open and flexible to the advice you receive from your peer student leaders and adviser.
- ✓ Develop a list of questions that you would like to have answered at orientation.

Transfer Credits and AP/IB scores

Many new students, along with transfer students, arrive at Juniata with college credits they earned at other institutions. If you have transfer credits, or wish to have your AP/IB scores considered for college credit, please ensure that your transcripts from other institutions and your scores have been sent to the Registrar's Office. This information will be necessary to determine whether you've already earned graduation requirements, pre-requisites, and equivalencies of our courses.

Residential Living

The Office of Residential Life offers a unique, fun, and comprehensive residential experience that prompts students to define their personal purpose. Campus living is a fundamental component of the college journey and shapes a memorable experience. Through a variety of campus opportunities, including exciting programs, stimulating workshops, and interpersonal interactions, students develop/strengthen necessary skills for navigating their college experience.

All full-time students are expected to reside in College-owned housing with a roommate. New students are assigned roommates based on the information provided in the online housing application. Guidelines for community living are available in detail through the campus computer network, Eaglenet; in the online student handbook, *The Pathfinder*; and in the Student Newsletter, published every summer.

Juniata recognizes the importance of providing reasonable accommodations in its housing policies and practices when necessary for individuals with disabilities to participate fully in the College Residential Life program. Although Juniata is a residential campus, exceptions are made for commuter students: students who live within 50 miles of Juniata and reside with their families or appointed legal guardian(s). Through a formal housing exemption process, a limited number of rising seniors, who meet certain criteria, may request to live in non-campus housing.



Applying for Housing

Complete the housing application and conduct a roommate search through Eagle's Nook, our housing software program. Your housing application and roommate request must be submitted by July 1, 2019. Housing assignments are made based upon your date of deposit to attend Juniata. Although we will try to accommodate your preferences, we cannot guarantee all requests. Final housing assignments will be sent to your Juniata email by the first week of August. Technology Information

The College provides network access in all residence hall rooms with both wired and wireless options, as well as connectivity for cable TV. For more information regarding student technology or technology questions please visit help.juniata.edu.

International Students

Domestic students interested in rooming with an international student may note that option on the roommate preference form. Our international students represent a wide range of countries from various parts of the world including Brazil, China, Colombia, Ecuador, France, Germany, Japan, and Korea.

Residence Hall Staff

Residential areas are managed by live-in professional staff members. Each professional staff member supervises a student staff of resident assistants (RAs) who live on each floor of the residence hall. The professional staff and RAs are qualified, well-trained, and available to assist and counsel students. The residential life staff typically plans and organizes a wide range of programs and activities including recreation and intramurals, educational presentations, trips, and social gatherings.

On-campus Residence Halls Available to New Students

Each residence hall is equipped with free laundry facilities. Storage space is not available during the summer months.

Lesher Hall

Lesher is the only all-female residence hall on campus. Lesher has a kitchen and a TV lounge. The basement serves as the home of the Juniata College Early Childhood Education Center.

Sunderland Hall

Sunderland is divided into East and West wings. (The East wing is an all-male hall; the West wing is an all-female hall.) The two sections are joined by a large lounge. The south side of the lounge area opens onto a patio/terrace that overlooks North Lawn, the site of many campus activities.

Sherwood Hall

Near the site of Juniata's legendary "Sherwood Forest," the popular residence hall is conveniently located near the soccer fields and Kennedy Sports and Recreation Center. Sherwood is co-ed by floor.

Tussey and Terrace Halls

Tussey and Terrace are connected by a large lounge area that adjoins the kitchen. The lounge opens onto a large, bricked terrace with benches and a built-in barbecue grill.

East Hall

East Hall features suite-style living with common areas. Each suite contains four double rooms, a bathroom, and a living room. These air conditioned rooms provide an independent atmosphere.



Transportation

During the regular school year, Juniata picks up enrolled students from local airports, bus stations, and train stations at predetermined dates and times for a small fee. For Summer Orientation, there is a special schedule. See www.juniata.edu/travel for details.

Health Care at Juniata

Reflecting its desire to promote good physical and mental health and prevent sickness, distress, and injury, Juniata provides its students with quality medical services. These services, which provide personal care to students unfamiliar with the area, are available to all full-time students, resident or non-resident.

Facilities

The College Health Center contains a main office, examination room, and an additional examination room for women's health.

Counseling Services offers three counseling offices and an office for psychiatric care that is available by appointment only on days and times listed below.

Staff and Services

A nurse and physician provide treatment for minor injuries and ailments as well as routine care for minor illnesses. The staff nurse is qualified to administer treatment for illnesses and injuries commonly suffered by college students and/or refer them to the proper health care professionals. After-hours and weekend emergency care is available at J.C. Blair Memorial Hospital or the Convenient Care Center at the student's own expense.

Counseling Services are available to assist students for a variety of reasons. Counseling can assist with adjusting to college, homesickness, relationship or family issues, emotional problems, drug and alcohol concerns, or to provide the clarity that talking out concerns in an objective setting can provide. Both individual and group counseling are available to all full-time students, including residential life staff who are presently attending Juniata. These services include assessments, short-term therapy, and when appropriate, referrals to more intensive treatment programs. Counseling Services offers five sessions per semester covered under the health services fee.



Extended services are available with a fee assessed for sessions beyond five per semester. Counseling Services is staffed with master's degree-level clinicians with psychiatric supervision. Emergency "on-call" services are available through the Dean on Duty Program or Public Safety. All records and information are handled with confidentiality.

Hospitalization

Should a student require hospital treatment, the J.C. Blair Memorial Hospital, which has 24-hour emergency room service, a four-star facility that is located less than five minutes away. Students who require hospitalization during the academic year have the option of seeking such care in their home area or of making arrangements to be hospitalized at J.C. Blair. The physician and Health Center nurse can assist with these arrangements. J.C. Blair Hospital has a Behavior Health Unit to assist in meeting the needs of students who may require acute mental health care.

Insurance

All full-time students are required to indicate proof of insurance that will provide coverage in the event of an accident. This proof is to be provided in the form of an online waiver included with the semester billing. An affordable annual insurance charge will be **included automatically unless the waiver is**

completed and submitted containing full insurance information. The insurance fee is not the same as the health and wellness fee.

Special Services

To supplement its health care programs, both Juniata's Health and Counseling Services Offices offer many other special services. A variety of wellness education and self-help programs are offered throughout the year. Outside resources are utilized to provide informational programs pertinent to the needs of today's young people. Further, the Health Center provides allergy medication management. In cooperation with J.C. Blair Memorial Hospital, labwork can be completed in the Health Center and can be sent to the laboratory at J.C. Blair. **Call the Health Center at 814-641-3410 for more information.**

Student Health Form

The required Student Health Form is available for download at www.juniata.edu/orientation. It becomes your permanent record in the Health Center while you are a student at Juniata. There are two parts to the form. The **first part** is to be filled out by you and your parent or guardian. The **second part** requires a physical examination by a physician, and completion of the immunization record. Also, please note that it is mandatory to include **insurance information** where indicated. Please include with your health record a copy of your insurance card, front and back. It is critical that you return the completed form to the Health Center.

In order to start fall semester classes and be considered a student in good standing, you must have a completed health record on file in the Health Center by the first day of classes. The Health Center is unable to treat students without a current health record on file.



Juniata College Mandatory Immunization Policy

The Immunization Program of the Pennsylvania Department of Health recommends that all colleges and universities adopt a mandatory immunization policy. Because of this recommendation and the continued concerted efforts of the American College Health Association and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention against vaccine-preventable diseases, Juniata has decided to adopt the following mandatory immunization requirements.

Measles Vaccine—required

All entering students without lab evidence of disease should receive two doses of measles vaccine. The first vaccine should be received on or after their first birthday and the second vaccine at least 28 days after the first dose. Simply stating you have had the disease is not sufficient.

Rubella Vaccine—required

All entering students should have received one dose of live virus rubella vaccine at 12 months of age or later. Simply stating that you have had the disease is not sufficient. Laboratory evidence of immunity is necessary if immunization cannot be documented.

Tetanus-Diphtheria-Pertussis Vaccine—required

All entering students should have received a primary series of DTP, DT, or Td and a booster of T-DAP within 10 years of matriculation.

Mumps Vaccine—required

All entering students should have received one dose of mumps vaccine given at 12 months of age or later. Simply stating that you have had the disease is not sufficient. Laboratory evidence of immunity is necessary if immunization cannot be documented.

Quantiferon Gold/Tspot

Tuberculosis screening within the past year is required of all students at high risk for TB as defined by the CDC (foreign-born persons from high prevalence countries, persons with compromised immune systems, close contact of infectious TB cases, etc.).

Meningitis—required to live on campus

College students are at an increased risk for meningitis and studies show new students living in dormitories have a six times higher risk than college students overall. Pennsylvania law requires all incoming new students who live on campus to have the vaccine. Booster is needed if first dose was given prior to age 16.

Please note that students must meet with a counselor for an intake prior to meeting with the psychiatrist.

Polio Vaccine—required

All entering students should have received a primary series in childhood and a booster only if needed for travel after age 18.

Hepatitis B—recommended

This vaccine series is highly recommended. Three doses, with doses one and two completed prior to arrival at Juniata, are strongly recommended.

Hepatitis A—recommended

** The responsibility for assuring that vaccination status is adequate and up-to-date rests with the student and their family. A careful review of past records is advised so that unnecessary immunization is avoided. These requirements will be strictly enforced. If they are not met by the beginning of the first semester, enrollment for the second semester will be contingent upon obtaining the required immunizations.
